



In her second year of law school, she discovered she was pregnant. With her entire future ahead of her and feeling unprepared for motherhood, she struggled with her boyfriend's lack of interest in fatherhood, as they were both students. While considering an abortion, fear prevented her from going through with the decision.

She had no option but to tell her parents. Her father reacted with immediate anger, disowning her on the spot. Her mother, filled with disappointment, questioned her wondering why she had chosen to ruin her life. When her parents refused to pay her school fees, Aduke had no choice but to drop out. Subsequently, she moved to a friend's apartment on campus.

Her pregnancy was difficult as her friend and boyfriend were her only support. He had no option but to stand by her choice to keep the baby. Escape Mag: Masonwabe, your art seems to beautifully encapsulate the rich heritage of South Africa, particularly the Xhosa culture. How do you see your work contributing to a broader narrative of African cultural expression and understanding?

Masonwabe: In my few years as a professionally practising artist I've noticed one thing, all African people share the same stories the only difference is location and language which I think is what makes our stories different. For me, the most important thing is portraying black people from a position of strength and power because a lot of the work about African people is poverty porn.

Escape Mag: The fusion of modernity with a nostalgic touch in your art style is truly captivating. How do you believe this unique blend can serve as a bridge between traditional African art and contemporary global aesthetics, fostering a sense of unity and recognition?

Masonwabe: To be honest I never think about such things but my being professionally trained as a textile designer indirectly informs and curates my traditionally inspired work to make sense in contemporary spaces.

Escape Mag: Having collaborated with international brands and being featured in museums across South Africa, how do you envision your art contributing to the broader conversation of African art on a global scale?



Masonwabe: My work is a realistic representation of Africa and African people so it serves not just art alone but as a tool to educate and inform people about my people and how they fit into the world of today.

Escape Mag: How has your background influenced your artistic vision, and how do you hope to inspire artists across the African continent with your story?

Masonwabe: I pride myself on being a representative of my people through my work as my work is heavily inspired by who I am and where I come from. For me, I'd like for people to see how patriotic I am about African culture and hopefully do the same with their respective ethnicities and cultures.

Escape Mag: Your involvement in creative direction within the music industry is noteworthy. Can you share how your experiences with artists like Cassper Nyovest and Simphiwe Dana have influenced your artistic approach, and how you bring a unique perspective to these collaborations?

Masonwabe: All those experiences were very unique in their own rights, I learnt a lot from them as they are industry legends and I was fresh out of university at the time. But I will say that the biggest lesson I learnt from those experiences was creative restraint. When working with such people there is a brief that you have to follow with obviously adding a bit of you in the project but never doing too much and that's something that I took with me and that as been my campus in how I navigate projects

Escape Mag: The initiation rituals and matriarchal celebrations depicted in your work provide a glimpse into the diverse cultures of South Africa. How do you believe showcasing these cultural nuances contributes to a more nuanced and accurate understanding of African traditions globally?

Masonwabe: I believe it portrays a more realistic image of who and what Africans are, and provides education about our identity as African people.

Escape Mag: What advice do you have for emerging artists aiming to make a global impact while staying true to their cultural roots?

Masonwabe: Always know that there are a lot of improvements to make and research is the answer to all problems.

Escape Mag: Hosting your first rug exhibition in 2022 received a very positive response. Can you explain the inspiration behind this unique form of artistic expression and how it complements your broader artistic portfolio?


Masonwabe: The rugs were an idea I came up with when I was trying to break into the industry and I only wanted to do it my way. I learnt and unlearned all I understood about rugs and then created what felt authentic to me and my work. The next step was to create a space for them to live for people to experience them and that's how the show was born, the natural progression of an idea

Escape Mag: Looking to 2024, Masonwabe, what are your artistic goals to make a bigger impact on the global art stage?

Masonwabe: To be honest I am where I am because it took me a lot of years to dream about what I have done. I am now at a point where I'm dreaming new dreams and relearning myself. But this year is going to be a beautiful one. I have a few things lined up.

In a lively iMessage chat that resonated with passion, Lucille Ozienkhaye, the 23-year-old non-binary artist, shared their journey—a tale of strength, youth, creativity, and brilliance that traverses continents and mediums.

"Painting has been my first love since I was three," Lucille began, reflecting on the early years spent in the United States. The move to Nigeria at six added layers to their artistic narrative, shaping expressions through the eyes of a black child navigating a distinct experience. "My art is a reflection of the distorted perspective of the black experience—we engage with it every day," they explained, their tone infused with a blend of conviction and introspection.

As a self-taught abstract painter, Lucille's canvas and wood creations tell a vivid story of manipulating the black form.

"I settled on stark black shades against vibrant colours to convey this distortion," they shared, drawing inspiration from contemporary artists like Adebayo Adebolaji and Kadine Lindsay.

But Lucille's creativity transcends the boundaries of a traditional canvas. "Wordsmithing became another therapy for me," they remarked, delving into a poetry series called 'Sojourner,' exploring the nonlinear nature of growth and the journey through depression.

I began affirming my gender in 2021 after cutting my hair short. I had never felt like I truly fit the expectations of African womanhood, and ultimately, gender is a social construct shaped by society. So, I chose to be seen as 'Lucille', free from any gendered expectations or implications.

I want people to take me as I am, without preconceptions. How I present myself each day is how I choose to express myself. As an artist, I appreciate the freedom and power this gives me.

In 2021, Lucille took up a tattoo apprenticeship, initially as a means to fund their endeavours. "It turned into a genuine appreciation of tattooing as a craft, especially in sustaining BIPOC and queer identities," they noted, reflecting on the unexpected turns of their artistic path.

And since 2023, Lucille has embarked on directing, adding a new chapter to their story. "Directing 'The Way It Seems' for the Ottawa Youth Infringement Festival in March 2024 is a thrilling new adventure," they exclaimed, underscoring the dynamic nature of their artistic journey.

Lucille Ozienkhaye's story is a captivating narrative—a tapestry woven with bold strokes of strength, the vibrancy of youth, the ingenuity of creativity, and the brilliance that emanates from a soul deeply connected to the pulse of Nigerian feminism.



Meet Faith Oluwajimi, the creative director of BLOKE, an artisanal label based in Lagos, Nigeria, that also produces garments in Nigeria. They have been running as a label for nine years now, and last year, BLOKE was the only African label nominated for the Louis Vuitton Moët Hennessy prize as well. They work with artisanal communities around Nigeria and outside Nigeria as well to make garments. Let's delve into the exclusive interview to discover what BLOKE is really about.

Escape Mag: What inspired you to embark on your self-exploration journey, and how has it influenced the design philosophy of Bloke?

Faith O: I found inspiration in a much younger version of myself. I've always had a desire to express myself creatively. There's this constant urge to create. I had the opportunity to spend time with a family friend who knew how to use a knitting machine, and I learned from her.

I saw it as an interesting medium to manipulate textiles, to create a form at the same time all starting with a single thread, and I kept on exploring ways to work around that, and that is what it is.

Escape Mag: In the world of fashion, inclusivity is often discussed, but your label actively champions it. Could you share the specific values and ideas that drive the inclusivity behind Bloke?

Faith O: I believe that one of the key concepts driving inclusivity within BLOKE is our approach to creating and curating the clothing. The conscious effort to involve diverse communities in working towards a common goal is something truly beautiful.


Escape Mag: Sustainability is at the core of Bloke's business model. Can you elaborate on the green initiatives and ethical practices implemented in the production processes of your garments?

Faith O: When creating our garments, we prioritize the use of renewable fabrics and organic textiles such as cotton and linen. This sustainable approach extends to our attention to fabrication techniques, including the use of Batik to repurpose textile fabrics and old garments, creating new patterns and improving overall textile quality. In addition, we utilize coconut shells as a biodegradable alternative to plastic buttons. Collaborating with local artisans helps us reduce carbon emissions in our logistics and operations. These are just a few examples of the sustainable practices we implement daily to run our brand.

Magazine: The launch of BLOKE PLUS seems exciting. How do you ensure that the diffusion label maintains the essence of Bloke while being more accessible in terms of both design and price?

Faith O: BLOKE's core audience comprises two key demographics: the early bloomers and the established professionals. These groups are most drawn to our brand.

Over the years, we've primarily focused on established professionals, which I attribute to my aspirational upbringing. I tailored our offerings for individuals like me. Now, I recognize the need to also engage with the early bloomers and establish a connecting platform, leading to the launch of the Plus label.

I don't anticipate any issues with connecting the aesthetics because the plus label is intended to mirror the main label, BLOKE. The pricing will be different. The emphasis on inclusivity is important because we want to make good design accessible. These are the key points we discussed when considering launching the idea.

Escape Mag: From your Milan Fashion Week debut to collaborations with international labels, could you reflect on key milestones in your career that have shaped Bloke into what it is today?

Faith O: I don't believe there is a single milestone. To me, it has just been one step after another. I am more enthusiastic about what I do because I know that the journey is not a straight line, there are curves and bumps and whatnot, but that's what makes the story interesting in the end.

Escape Mag: The fashion industry is everevolving. How do you stay true to your creative ethos while navigating the dynamic landscape of trends and consumer expectations?



Faith O: We've never been that brand that cares so much about trends, what we do as a label is that we tell stories.

We tell stories about the African experience from different perspectives and different issues that are connected to the African experience in modern times. Going through that knowledge and wealth of understanding that there's so much embedded into that alone has been a driving force to constantly say something and also keep it fresh because we also need to tell our stories, you know.

Escape Mag: Collaboration seems to be a recurring theme in your journey. How do these partnerships contribute to the uniqueness of Bloke, and what do you look for in collaborators?



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Faith O: One of the things I look for when collaborating is a way to say something louder and also to explore new techniques and new ways of telling the same story. And I find that process very rewarding and interesting. And also it's a way to rub minds together. As humans, we need a community and collaboration is a very effective way of doing that.

Escape Mag: As a self-taught designer, what advice would you give to aspiring creatives looking to break into the fashion industry?

Faith O: My advice to anyone is not to be swayed by current feelings. You need to ask yourself, what am I trying to say? With so many brands, why should anyone listen to you? You must have a purpose behind it. Have a conviction and a concise story to tell, and the rest will follow.

Escape Mag: Bloke has garnered acclaim both nationally and internationally. How do these awards influence your creative process and the overall vision for the brand?

Faith O: how it impacted the progression of the label would just be serving as a reminder that there are both high points and considerably low points.

Escape Mag: Lastly, how do you envision the future of Bloke, considering the fashion industry's continuous evolution and the growing importance of ethical and inclusive practices?

Faith O: BLOKE will become more refined and focused on the core of our operations, which is creating sustainable and ethical garments. It will always revolve around that.

#### Escape Mag: Any final comments?

Faith O: I believe discussions like this are crucial as they enable both the creator and the audience to pause and comprehend the reasoning behind our actions. It serves as a constant reminder for us to not just keep going in circles, but to slow down and reflect on our thoughts.







# MEET UYIOSA: A TALENTED YOUNG MODEL MAKING INCREDIBLE STRIDES.



Meet <u>Uyiosa</u>, a 22-year-old model who's been storming creative spaces, in less than 4 years she started her journey. We talk about the reality of being a queer model, navigating a country like Nigeria; taking a peek into Uyiosa's little corner of the world.

EM: How would you introduce yourself?

UYI: I feel like there are so many things I'm doing or I want to do but I introduce myself with the work I'm currently doing. My name is Uyiosa Theresa Ajayi, a 21-year-old model, turning 22 in November. I also work in an advertising and marketing agency as a community manager and digital strategist. That's how I'd introduce myself for now. I'm also a casting director, helping other models get jobs.

EM: What was the genesis of your modelling journey? UYI: I've wanted to do modelling for as long as I can remember, which I'm passionate about. I wanted to start as early as possible, but my dad wanted me to finish secondary school first. I started modelling right after high school at 17. I remember getting my Polaroid taken in 2018 and sending it to agencies. It wasn't till 2019 that I got signed but even then, it was a series of trial and error; a lot more errors. They didn't do anything tangible and I had to figure things out myself, I didn't have anyone to guide me.

Following Uyi's work on Instagram, particularly from 2019, it was evident that Uyi was consistently dedicated. The following response showcases her humility, so don't be misled, folks!

EM: Your work rate and consistency are commendable, talk about that, please.

UYI: Haha, I wouldn't say so. I think I'm amazing at what I do and I think I do it well but I don't think I've achieved a certain level of consistency and that's partly because of school. I go to school in Edo state so it's hard to book jobs and collaborations with other artists and creatives when you're not in a central place. There aren't a lot of modelling opportunities in Edo but I do want to work more. The work rate is definitely doubling this year, I'm planning to collaborate more now I'm in Lagos to make up for lost time.

EM: What's your experience being a Nigerian queer creative? How do you navigate your little corner of the world?

UYI: Being queer and Nigerian hasn't come into play for me because it isn't something I offer up as information a lot of the time. The niggas who know, know and the ones who don't... If you're on my social media, it's easy to take a wild guess but if we aren't tight I come off straight passing so it's easy to navigate my world. I don't get a lot of "Are you gay?" questions and I'd like for it to remain that way. Another reason I don't offer up this part of myself as information, aside from the fact that well Nigeria is Nigeria; I'd hate to deal with people's bullshit and opinions, I've had enough of that. You figure out that people don't want to hear that. I'm also thankful that the modelling spaces I find myself in are very progressive, so that helps.

I navigate the world in general, in a very "keep your head down, do this thing and get it over with" way.

I also don't make too much of a fuss over things and I find that funny because I'm very loud when it comes to social justice and human rights issues. It's been really hard knowing what battles to pick and choose when people talk about your life in a degrading way, like you don't have the right to exist. People are way too homophobic, I have to decide a lot of the time if I want to take up an argument and lead them into knowing I'm queer or shut up instead.

I was on the set of a music video one time and a conversation erupted about how there were gay men on set. I found that really disgusting and spoke up. I can't remember the exact statement I made but I think I used "we" while defending, which of course gave an inkling I was gay. Someone then asked "Oh are you gay?" I'm like "Are we friends? Why do you think you deserve an answer?"

# EM: Has modelling impacted your personal life in any way?

UYI: Meeting casting agents and others toughened me, and improved my delivery, punctuality, and creativity. I'm more involved in the creative process, kinder, and outgoing. It's made me better at handling stress and has connected me with great people and a community.

#### EM: Any highlights of your journey so far?

UYI: The only highlight that comes to mind that I think is a huge profile, is VOGUE. Being published in 2023 was amazing. Another highlight is the community and family I've found in this business. The photographers, makeup artists, everyone's been wonderful and sweet.

## EM: If you weren't modelling, what would you do?

I'm really happy about this question. There are many other things I've been doing aside from modelling because gigs don't come as frequently as I'd like. If I wasn't modelling, I'd be doing what I'm doing right now which is Marketing and Advertising. It isn't my first pick but I'm a Communications student. I'm also into video production (mostly music videos and ads), and I'd like to get into that.

I also want to be a producer and event manager; managing concerts and shows. Be a project manager for entertainment stuff. Besides all that and I already am, I want to be an SJW (Social Justice Warrior) because I'm very passionate about human beings and the way they should be treated.

Everyone deserves to be treated respectfully no matter what their choices are or their differences. I also hope I'm able to be a philanthropist very soon because these causes require more than speaking on them but also putting your money where your mouth is or in this case, actions. I've also wanted to be on the radio as well. So many different things, also content creation in beauty, fashion, lifestyle, and things that appeal to me.

# EM: What's an African favourite on your playlist right now?

Immediately I saw this question, I was super gassed. My African favourite has to be Ruger's 'Girlfriend'. I love that song and if you know Ruger, tell him to put me in the video. I've been in one of his videos before so he needs to hit me up, I NEED to be on that song!

A Journey of Art, Advocacy, and Infinite Expression.

EDEGWARE OGHENEKENO PEACE, also known as "girlwithdsigns", a versatile African creative, brings a wealth of experience as a creative director for prominent projects like Electro Africa and Digital Escape Africa. With a passion for dancing, painting, and creating, she aspires to continually evolve and achieve more in the world of creativity. Explore the limitless possibilities with Keno French, the girlwithdsigns, as she seamlessly blends artistry and innovation.

The distinctive quality I bring to every endeavour is Curiosity. Through curiosity, I am very open-minded, I tend to ask the right questions, and that aids me in connecting the dots. In my world of creation, I feel like a player in a video game; at times it's game over, but I get to play again and again until I reach the final objective.

Escape Mag: How do dancing, painting, and creating intersect in your creative process and contribute to your overall message?

Keno French: They may not intersect, or maybe they do and I haven't figured it out yet. Essentially, for me, these forms of expression are distinct ways I enjoy expressing myself. I enjoy dancing in my room whenever I can, especially when I'm very stressed or excited; it's my go-to when emotions are intense. Occasionally, I dabble in painting to awaken my inner muse, to give my creativity a little push and see what magical surprises might appear on the canvas.

Escape Mag: Your alias, "girlwithdsigns," suggests a strong connection to visual communication. Can you share a bit about how your journey with placard art began, and how it has evolved?

Keno French: When I started I wouldn't say I saw it as art or any big deal. I was inspired by a picture of Gary Vee I saw on Instagram, holding a placard that said "Stop Giving a fuck what other people think". Immediately I saw that, it lit a bulb in my head and I went out with my friends to shoot my first sign and posted it immediately, I didn't even have a second thought. Surprisingly, It got a lot of traction and since then I've been consistent with it, using it as a form of expressing myself, starting meaningful conversations and fostering positive change.

Escape Mag: You've been involved in diverse projects, from Electro Africa to Digital Escape Africa. How do you navigate the different creative landscapes, and what unique elements do you bring to each venture?

Keno French: I like to think of myself as a problem solver, not necessarily someone with all the solutions but someone bold enough to delve into the problem and find a solution regardless of the odds.

Escape Mag: As the human billboard, you've used public spaces to communicate agendas and protest against issues. How do you choose the locations for your displays, and what impact do you hope to achieve through this unconventional form of expression?

Keno French: At the beginning, I didn't really care much about the locations for my sign. I held my first sign at Ring Road, Benin City; The centre of Benin. If you've been to Benin City, you'd know that everyone passes there to get anywhere. All I thought was, this is a busy place and I wanted people to see me and hear me. Over time, I got more intentional with the signs and paid closer attention to the locations to give more meaning to the message I was passing across or sometimes to add some humour to the content. Like I said, when I started this there wasn't any deep thinking. I just did it out of creative impulse and looking back now I've held different signs at different significant places, speaking on important societal issues, like during the end SARS protest, and during the long ASUU strike that affected a lot of students including myself at the time. I'm not sure the exact effect my signs will have, but I'm confident they're propelling me forward, and I believe they'll make a meaningful contribution to society.

Escape Mag: Your goal is to encourage freedom of expression in any form. How do you see art as a catalyst for social change, and what role do you envision for yourself in this movement?

Keno French: Well, the thing is society is like a painting on a canvas and each colour and brushstroke are different individuals expressing themselves in whatever unique form they can. Could be through dancing, writing, fashion and designing, or anything at all.

I see myself as a part of that diversity of expression, hoping to affect the overall design, style or look of the painting on the canvas.

Escape Mag: In a world that sometimes restricts creative expression, how do you navigate challenges and setbacks, and what advice do you have for aspiring artists looking to break free from conventional norms?



The distinctive quality I bring to every endeavour is Curiosity.

Keno French: I always keep it going, keep it rolling, and even when I stop, I recharge and pick up where I left off. It's never easy, nothing is actually. I don't think I'm in a position to advise anyone because I'm mostly learning on the go. But I'd say, just keep looking, keep searching, don't stop trying. Have the courage to follow your intuitions. Stay willing, staying hungry and stay foolish. It's a life long journey, be a life long student.

Escape Mag: You're a creative director with a passion for innovation. Can you share a project that challenged you the most and how you overcame it, pushing the boundaries of both artistry and innovation?

Keno French: I've faced some thrilling challenges in several projects. One memorable experience was working with Electro Africa for the first time in 2021. It was a thrilling yet demanding experience because it was my first time curating an event.

Another significant challenge came with "The B-side Album", a collaborative project by different creatives in Benin City. Everyone had their different perspectives and ideas, It wasn't an easy one managing the different artistic voices while staying true to the project's essence.

To overcome these challenges, I had to wear many hats — a listener, a mediator, and a visionary. In the end, both projects were more than just tough nuts to crack. They were more like rocket fuel for my creative journey.

Escape Mag: "Escape" means breaking free. How do you want your audience to feel and what do you hope they take away from your creativity?

Keno French: When I reflect on my journey, I've realized that some of the most incredible things that happened weren't part of the plan. They just sprouted from the freedom and joy of creating. I want people who come across my art to feel the freedom and liberation that comes from creating. Because, honestly, the more you create, the more you're hooked on that feeling of freedom.
