CHALE More Than Meets the Ear



The Visual Maestro

> Jyde Ajala is undeniably the name on everyone's lips. His ability to transform songs into captivating visual narratives has made him the go-to director for Nigeria's biggest stars. From Wande Coal's soulful melodies to Olamide's street vibes and Victony's raw energy, Ajala's artistry shines through. We sat down with the visionary director to uncover the creative genius behind the lens.

Escape Mag: The industry's buzzing about your recent work. What initially drew you towards music video directing, and how did you break into this competitive space?

JYDE: Thank you so much. It's an incredible honour. I've always been passionate about arts and entertainment from a young age. I grew up in a regular Nigerian home, but I always enjoyed watching Charlie Chaplin and classic Hollywood movies. I would run around the house performing and entertaining the family. As a teenager, I realised this was the path I wanted to follow and decided to pursue an education in film production. After school, I kept grinding over the years, and all of that has led me to this point in my career.

Escape Mag: Your background seems to suggest a photographer's eye for detail. How does your approach to photography translate into the world of music videos?

JYDE: That's a really good question. Photography and cinematography are both visual arts that involve capturing images. The main difference is that one captures still images while the other captures moving images.

I try to incorporate the same discipline into both. My background in photography actually stems from a film school class. That's how I started taking photos. Essentially, there's no music video without pictures. All we're doing is capturing images at 24 frames per second, which is essentially taking pictures in motion. So, they go hand in hand. There's no cinematography without photography.

How do you use colour palettes to tell a story within the music video? Can you walk us through your creative process in this regard?

JYDE: Colour is a powerful tool in cinematography, capable of evoking strong emotions. I strive to use colour to complement the story's essence. Different colours convey distinct meanings; for instance, red differs significantly from black or white. The colour palette depends on the desired atmosphere. A trap music video might call for a predominantly black colour scheme to match the mood.

Colour planning begins in preproduction, involving collaboration with set designers, creative directors, production designers, and art directors. We consider character attributes, setting aesthetics, and overall tone to create a cohesive colour palette. Wardrobe, hair, and makeup also play crucial roles in maintaining visual harmony. Ultimately, colour is a valuable tool

for enhancing storytelling and character development.

Escape Mag: We've seen everything from pastel wonderlands to meticulously curated sets in your videos. What inspires your set design choices, and how do they complement the music?

JYDE: I believe storytelling is central to my work. Every element, from a white wall to a burning candle, carries a narrative. Understanding the story we want to convey is the foundation for set design. Whether it's a lavish lifestyle or a more modest setting, the narrative dictates the visual world.




By immersing ourselves in the story, we make informed decisions and create a cohesive environment that effectively communicates the desired emotions and atmosphere. Also, Life experiences significantly influence set design. Travel, museums, history, and art expose you to diverse shapes, architecture, and narratives. These elements often serve as inspiration.

Every project is unique, requiring collaboration with set designers and the creative team to bring the vision to life. It's about combining your ideas with their expertise to create the perfect set for the project.



Escape Mag: Your music videos feel like minimovies. What are some directors or filmmakers who inspire you, and how do their influences translate into your work?

JYDE: Man, that's a tough question. I admire so many incredible filmmakers. David Fincher, Martin Scorsese, James Cameron, and Christopher Nolan are some of my favourites. Mel Gibson is another underrated director with an impressive filmography.

Charlie Chaplin is a legend who inspired me from a young age. Denis Villeneuve's work on "Dune" is phenomenal. And of course, Jordan Peele is killing it right now. Alejandro González Iñárritu is another brilliant director.

Quentin Tarantino is a must-mention. There are countless others I could name, but these are just a few.

A lot of directors have inspired me over the years. Steven Spielberg, for instance, is another one I left out. Martin Scorsese

How could I forget Spike Lee? I've studied their work extensively and often include subtle homages in my projects.

As a filmmaker at heart, I'm always searching for the story in everything. There's a narrative in every situation, no matter how ordinary. I try to inject humour and create music videos that are enjoyable and rewatchable. Essentially, I'm telling stories I want to see – relatable, fun stories.

These directors have influenced my visual style, and I'm constantly learning and developing my own approach. I see these music videos as a platform to showcase my abilities before transitioning to feature films. By studying their work and incorporating their techniques, I'm building a strong foundation for my future projects.

Escape Mag: You've collaborated with some of Nigeria's biggest names. What's the creative dynamic like working with such established artists? How do you find a balance between their vision and your artistic voice?

JYDE: It's been a blessing working with so many incredible superstars. I've been fortunate to collaborate with individuals who trust our process and believe in our ability to contribute. Mutual respect is essential.

Building trust takes time, especially when balancing your creative vision with the client's brand. It's about finding that sweet spot between your artistic expression and your goals. Communication and compromise are key.

While challenges arise, adaptability and a diplomatic approach help navigate these situations. Ultimately, it's about finding the right balance and delivering a product that aligns with the client's vision.

Escape Mag: Any upcoming projects you can tease for our readers? Are there any dream collaborations you have on your bucket list?

JYDE: Um, yes, we have a few projects underway. We just wrapped up a commercial for the fashion brand Ashluxe, and we're excited to share it with you all. We're also developing a web series, and writing scripts, and looking forward to sharing that as well. More music videos are on the way too. Some exciting stuff is coming up, so stay tuned!

Man, there are so many incredible people I'd love to collaborate with. Saint Jhn is definitely on that list. I'm a huge fan of his music. In Nigeria, Tems is a fire artist I'd love to work with. Bloody Civilian is also cool. There are countless artists I admire, but those are a few.

Someone else I'd love to collaborate with is Wasiu Ayinde (KWAM 1). It might be unexpected, but he's a Fuji legend, and we share the same name.

There are also countless people in the movie space I'd love to work with, but that's a topic for another time.





Escape Mag: With your background in photography and directing, what advice would you give to aspiring creatives looking to make their mark in the Nigerian entertainment industry?

JYDE: Man, what advice would I give to aspiring creatives? Honestly, just believe in yourself. The industry can be cutthroat, but you must believe in your dreams and grind it out. Keep developing yourself, and the opportunities will come.

Sometimes hope dwindles, but patience and persistence define you. People are always watching. It might not seem like it, but they see your work. Please keep working on yourself.

Mental health is crucial for creatives. Don't hesitate to talk to someone if you're going through a rough patch. Don't be ashamed. It's part of the journey. Sometimes things don't go well, but keep moving forward. Talking about mental health is still stigmatised in Nigeria, but we creatives should check in on each other and inspire one another.

Remember, everything can change overnight. One project can be a game-changer. Just be ready when you get a chance. Keep grinding, and know that it's possible.



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

FIBROIDS The Silent Epidemic

Several tests can confirm the presence, size, and location of fibroids: Pelvic examination, Ultrasound, Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI), Hysterosonography, Hysterosalpingography and Hysteroscopy.
